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#### FROM YOUR COMMITTEE

#### **PLAYING IN AN AMATEUR CHAMBER GROUP**



The Dalyma Trio (David Olson, violin, Lynda Moon, piano, and Marja Cope, cello) is named from the first names of its members. We met in 1994 at CAMMAC Cedar Glen, which was then the location of the Ontario summer music camp. We were inspired by the coaching of Susan Green, cellist, who encouraged us to stay together, and here we are, almost fifteen years later,

still playing together!

Over the years we have enjoyed attending CAMMAC camps and workshops, have received coaching and performed for community groups, libraries, retirement homes, churches, receptions and fundraising events. Chamber music has been described as "the music of friends", and playing in a chamber music ensemble is a wonderful shared experience. The following are some resources and tips I would like to share in gratitude to Marja and David for our years together, and in appreciation for the advice and support which we have received from CAMMAC coaches and friends. By the way, I chose 15 tips to honour our trio's fifteen years together.

#### **TIPS FOR AMATEUR CHAMBER GROUPS**

1. Rehearse regularly and set goals together. Commitment is important to continuing as an ensemble.

- 2. Variety in repertoire helps keep things interesting both for musicians and the audience. Choose pieces with a suitable technical level. Develop repertoire lists to aid in planning.
- 3. Once the group has chosen music to work on, prepare your own part and work out fingerings. Difficult chamber music will require more preparation time, particularly for the pianist. Consult the full score. Strings will want to work on bowings together.
- 4. At the beginning of a rehearsal, after tuning, try a brief focusing exercise such as playing slowly together the scale of the key in which the piece is written.
- 5. Agreement on interpretation, including tempo, may evolve gradually. Be flexible and open to each other's suggestions.
- 6. Music making is in the details. Intonation, balance and dynamics are important in ensemble work. Actively listen to your colleagues and know when to pull back or adjust pitch. Be aware of who has the melody and who is accompanying at various points. Beginnings and endings of phrases, transitions, pauses, and rests are crucial. Know who is leading the entries. Breathe together. Working out small details such as articulation, note lengths, rubato in phrases, and variations in repeats can lead to greater nuances in performance. Practice passages with tricky rhythms slowly, with a metronome.

- 7. Value the strengths of each ensemble member. In our trio, for example, David has the strongest sense of rhythm, Marja has a natural awareness of phrasing and expression, and I bring a knowledge of form and harmonic language.
- 8. Take breaks during the rehearsal and allow for social time. When rehearsals take place at home, this is easy to do. Our trio often has lunch together after a practice session.
- 9. Coaching will take you to another level in your playing.
- 10. Listen to concert performances and recordings. There are many chamber works on YouTube as well. It is fun to attend concerts together and share responses.
- 11. Break the mold. Have fun sight reading or "jamming" from time to time. Take turns leading and surprising each other. There are books of 'encore' pieces that are good for this. Invite other instrumentalists or singers to join you.
- 12. Family and friends are a wonderful support. Offer to play for special events such as birthdays, anniversaries and holiday parties. Our trio has had some lovely trips out of town to play for family members in Washington DC, Syracuse NY and Perth Ontario.
- 13. Think of your audience and venue when planning a program. The Dalyma Trio has played in many retirement homes. In a concert setting, we usually play a classical trio as well as arrangements of opera tunes, dances and folk music. There is something to please most tastes. When asked to provide music for receptions and afternoon teas, we play salon music.
- 14. Try out the acoustics of your performance space before beginning a concert. Also check lighting and seating arrangements.
- 15. In performance, be confident and focussed, look at each other, smile and acknowledge the audience. Above all, share your love of music and the joy of playing together. Tape your concert performance when possible. This can be very instructive for later work, but also captures the spirit of the occasion.

#### **RESOURCES FOR AMATEUR CHAMBER GROUPS**

CAMMAC is a wonderful organization for those of us who are amateur chamber players! Ontario Music Centre at Lakefield has coached chamber groups and offers an Introduction to Chamber Music course. Lake MacDonald Music Centre in Quebec has several chamber weeks during its summer music program. It also holds an annual chamber music weekend in May (15-18, 2009). Our trio has participated in May weekends in the past and found the coaching very worthwhile. Workshops are offered during the year by CAMMAC Toronto Region. Our trio is looking forward to the chamber music workshop in February. (Registration is now closed.) Among the coaches we have had in the past are Ralph Aldrich, Terence Helmer, Mayumi Seiler, Moshe Hammer and Jenny Crober. Performing/Playing Opportunities are

#### **SOURCES FOR CHAMBER MUSIC SCORES**

**Toronto Public Library.** Toronto Reference Library, 789 Yonge St. www.torontopubliclibrary.ca. The Performing Arts Dept, 5th floor, has thousands of circulating scores, including a large collection of chamber music ranging from standard works to lesser-known compositions. These scores may be borrowed from the Reference Library, or you may place a hold through the online catalogue using your library card and have the music sent to any branch location for pick up.

Canadian Music Centre. National Office, 20 St. Joseph St. 416-961-6601 <a href="https://www.musiccentre.ca/ont.cfm">www.musiccentre.ca/ont.cfm</a>. The library of the CMC is an excellent source for Canadian compositions. Check the home page under "Find Music" to search for scores available for loan. Timings are given for the pieces, a useful feature. You may also listen on site to CDs, which may help you in your choice.

The Sound Post. 93 Grenville St. 416-971-6990 www.thesoundpost.com. The Sound Post has a large selection of chamber music scores. Check the Online Store on their website. Music can be purchased on line or in person.

**Royal Conservatory of Music Bookstore.** 273 Bloor St. W., 416-585-2225. The RCM bookstore, operated by Long & McQuade, includes chamber music in its selection of sheet music. The stock listing is not available on line, but staff provide assistance.

In addition to the above sources, it is useful to look out for used music sales – for example, of the Faculty of Music, University of Toronto. There are also numerous internet sites for sheet music purchase and downloading.

### Schubert: Mass in A flat

Date: SUNDAY, MARCH 1, 2009

Time: 2 PM SHARP. Please arrive 15 minutes early to set up.

Conductor: ERIK GERO

Music: This mass can be regarded as the Missa Solemnis of Schubert. He spent three years, an unusually long time for

Schubert, composing it. He planned to dedicate the piece to the Emperor in the hope of obtaining the position of court composer. On the advice of the leader of the court orchestra that " The Mass was good, but not composed in the style that the Emperor likes", Schubert decided not to apply and not to dedicate the mass at all. This

ended his hopes for a position for life. Schubert considered the work as one of his finest.

Biography: Erik Gero was born in Budapest, Hungary. He first studied engineering, then attended and graduated from the

Franz Liszt Music Academy in Budapest. As a member of the *Franz Liszt Chamber Choir* he was involved in several recording projects, festivals and tours, amongst others a North American tour and participation in the *International Choral Festival* at Yale University in New Haven, CT. For a five year period, he was assistant conductor with the *Népszínház Opera Company* in Budapest where he conducted over 200 performances. In 1989, he moved to Canada and settled in Toronto with his family. Here, he worked as music director and organist at various churches. In 1998, he won first prize with his choral compositions at the *International Amadeus Choral Competition*. Erik moved to the Niagara Region, and from 2004 - 2007, he directed the

Peninsula Symphony Orchestra.

"diplomatic reasons" it was finished in the very last years of Bach's life, when he had already gone blind. This monumental work is a synthesis of every stylistic and technical contribution that the Cantor of Leipzig made to

Biography: Recently appointed Music Director of the Church of Saint Mary Magdalene in Toronto

Stephanie Martin carries on the tradition of a cappella choral singing established by Healey

Willan in the 1920's.

Artistic Director of Pax Christi Chorale since 1996, Ms. Martin has conducted many memorable performances with choir and orchestra, and has commissioned several new Canadian compositions. Highlights include Bach's Saint John Passion; Handel's Israel in Egypt; Brahms' Requiem; Mendelssohn's Elijah and Saint Paul; Poulenc's Gloria; Vaughan William's Hodie and Dona Nobis Pacem, Britten's Saint Nicolas and Elgar's The Music

Makers. Ms. Martin holds the distinction of being the first Canadian woman to conduct a full performance of Elgar's Dream of Gerontius. In April 2007 she received an honourary membership in the Elgar Society, with a note from the British Chairman, Andrew Neill who said, "our congratulations and appreciation to Professor Martin for her contribution to the music of Elgar in this, the 150th anniversary year of his birth".

Choral conductor, composer, harpsichordist and organist, she can be heard on the Naxos, Marquis and Dorian labels, as well as several self-produced recordings. Her love of historically informed performance was fostered over 15 years of activity with Arbor Oak Trio which performed hundreds of chamber music concerts and several fully staged dramatic works, including Arne's rarely heard *Love in a Village*, and Gay's *Beggar's Opera*. Ms. Martin holds degrees from the University of Toronto and Wilfrid Laurier University, and is an Associate of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. She is an Assistant Professor of music at York University, Toronto, in the

Department of Music, Faculty of Fine Arts.



#### HARPIST FIRED FOR PLAYING TOO LOUDLY

.ATLANTA (AP)-The Atlanta Symphony Orchestra has fired its harpist, saying she played fortissimo during the pianissimo. The harpist, however, denies she's heavy handed. Judith Beattie Ryan says it's all part of a five-year plan to kick her out of her chair. When she was told April 18 she had been fired for insubordination, Ryan, a 22-year veteran of the Symphony, already had been informed that her contract would not be renewed because of incompetence, her lawyer said vesterday. Ryan was insubordinate because she played too loudly during quiet passages of Stephen Paulus' Concerto For Orchestra the previous weekend, said Thomas Bacchetti, the symphony's executive director. Music director Yoel Levi repeatedly admonished Ryan, Bacchetti said. "That left Mr. Levi with no choice but to believe she willfully disregarded his directions," Bacchetti said. Levi was wielding the baton during the April 11-13 performances.

"If he thought the harp too loud, he didn't do anything about it," said Ryan's attorney, Debra Schwartz. "She claims she played it exactly as she was instructed," Schwartz said. "He made no attempt to get her to play it any differently. And she's got witnesses." And that includes the audience, Schwartz said. The Atlanta Journal-Constitution's review of the April performance praised the orchestra for playing the piece "with precision and panache." It didn't mention the harp. Ryan declined to talk with reporters about her firing, but her lawyer contends musicianship has nothing to do with the dispute. In 1986, then-music director

Robert Shaw tried to fire Ryan for musical incompetence, but an arbitrator from the Chicago Symphony Orchestra upheld her ability.

In October 1989, Levi notified Ryan that her contract would be allowed to expire this summer, again because of musical incompetence; Ryan, 44, again filed for arbitration.
